Community Support Hub Update from Dave Wraight, Hub Oversight

Community Support

As we move through the Government's Covid-19 Roadmap to Recovery, the Community Support Hub continues as an operation to respond to calls from the public for assistance, support and help. Since the start of this month (April 2021), the Hub has also been involved in contacting those who tested positive for Covid to offer support to maintain self isolation and to connect community support groups to those who are in need.

Now, as the acute pressure of the pandemic is starting to ease, and the requirement to shield for people considered Clinically Extremely Vulnerable has ceased, the role and function of the Hub is changing and evolving. Since the recent peak in December 2020 there has been a reduction of calls to the Hub of 65% to the present day, illustrating the impact of the falling number of cases, the vaccine and easing of restrictions.

We remain very grateful to the communities and groups in West Berkshire who have remained committed to supporting and helping those in need over the last year.

Covid-19 Vaccination Updates

Encouraging vaccine take-up



This week the Government has launched the 'Every vaccination gives us hope' campaign, to encourage under-50s to take up the offer of a COVID-19 vaccine during the second phase of the roll-out. The <u>adverts highlight the significant role the vaccine is playing</u> in preventing infections, hospitalisations and deaths, as we continue on the path back to recovery and re-set. The adverts will run across TV, radio, multicultural media, social media and billboards in prominent locations across the UK, and can be shared on your social media channels.

This comes as a series of photographs have been published to mark the success of the vaccination programme to date, showcasing individuals and teams behind the rollout. Photojournalists Jude Palmer, Glenn Edward and Liam McBurney toured the UK over the past few months capturing intimate moments during the monumental national effort, creating a series of poignant, never-before-seen photographs, from care homes to cathedrals and museums to stadiums. The images provide an opportunity to look back on the programme, reflecting on the heroic efforts to protect those most vulnerable and look ahead to the second phase of the vaccination programme.

Covid-19 vaccine advice for pregnant women



The Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI) confirmed that there have been no specific safety concerns identified with any COVID-19 vaccine in relation to pregnancy.

The JCVI is therefore advising that pregnant women should be offered the vaccine at the same time as the rest of the population, based on their age and clinical risk group.

The JCVI also advised that it's preferable for pregnant women in the UK to be offered the Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna vaccines where available. There is no evidence to suggest that other vaccines are unsafe for pregnant women, but more research is needed.

Covid testing

Lateral Flow Testing (rapid Covid-19 testing)

Rapid Covid-19 tests (also known as lateral flow tests) are now available for all, providing you do not have Covid symptoms. There are a number of ways to get the free tests - including from West Berkshire Council's community test sites, mobile collect van and participating pharmacies.

Visiting arrangements in care homes

This week (28 April), the Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) updated the guidance on visiting arrangements in care homes to clarify that named visitors should be tested using rapid Lateral Flow Tests (LFTs) on the day of every visit:

Symptomatic Testing (if you are displaying symptoms of Covid-19)

If you are displaying any of the following symptoms:

- A high temperature
- A new, continuous cough
- You've lost your sense of smell or taste, or it's changed

...then you should book a PCR (Polymerase Chain Reaction) test and not a lateral flow/home test.

For information on how to obtain or book a PCR test (either through your local PCR testing site which for West Berkshire is the Newbury Showground) or to receive a PCR test in the post, you should visit https://www.gov.uk/get-coronavirus-test. This also contains helpful instructions on how to isolate, who is eligible for the test, and what additional support is available during your isolation period.

Celebrating Eid safely

Eid -UI Fitr (Eid) is the first day after Ramadan (12 May –13 May) and is celebrated by Muslims performing a mid-morning prayer either at the Mosque or as a communal gathering in parks. COVID-19 regulations do not prevent such outdoor gatherings, but MHCLG has advised faith leaders that large events will inevitably carry risks and, if they are to proceed, must be managed in a way that minimises those risks.

If faith leaders do wish to arrange outdoor gatherings, please see the below suggested guidance from the Government:

- The gatherings should be COVID-19 Secure, consistent with guidance on outdoor events
- They should be modest in size to minimise risks
- To ensure social distancing requirements are respected, they should also be well stewarded
- Faith leaders planning events must carry out risk assessments
- Most importantly, any event should be planned and managed working in partnership with the owner of the space, the council, the local police and other local partners

Please wear a face covering where required, unless you are exempt. Visors and shields alone don't adequately cover your nose and mouth, so can't filter airborne particles.

Customers reminded to look out for their tax credits renewals packs

HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) has started to send out about 2.5 million annual renewals packs to tax credits customers. The packs will be sent out over the next six weeks and all customers should receive theirs by 4 June. HMRC recognises that many tax credits customers will have been affected by the pandemic and may have earned less money than in previous years. It is important that customers check the details contained in their annual renewal pack are correct, including income details. See further information.

REMINDER: West Berkshire Mental Health Fund is open for applications
